Why we have introduced this charge?

Like all councils, East Herts is facing financial challenges. We need to find ways to save money or generate income to bridge the £4 million gap in our finances. The council no longer receives money from the government known as the Revenue Support Grant to support the delivery of its services to our residents. In addition, the impact of the pandemic has worsened this financial position. We have looked at all of our services to see where we could spend less or do things differently. Waste and recycling is the single largest area where we spend millions of pounds, and the garden waste service is a large portion of that service which we do not legally have to deliver. We still believe this to be a convenient and cost effective way of disposing of your garden waste. For more information about the garden waste service please visit www.eastherts.gov.uk/gardenwaste

How to sign up

The quickest and easiest way to sign up is online. Visit our website www.eastherts.gov.uk/gardenwaste and follow our step by step guide on how to subscribe.

- •The '21/22 annual charge for the garden waste service is £49.
- •Sign up by Direct Debit by 22 March to ensure you claim the reduced rate of £45 (this offer applies to online sign ups only).
- •You can select to pay for more than one collection. Each further collection will be ± 49 for each additional bin for up to three brown bins.
 - •Please note that additional bins will also need to be ordered at a delivery cost of £35 per bin, and may take 4-6 weeks to be delivered.
 - •You will need to pay by debit or credit card. Please note we can't accept cash or cheque payments for the service.

By signing up by 22 March you will see no break in your collection service. Once you have subscribed you will then continue to receive garden waste collections fortnightly for 12 months until 31 March 2022, on the same day as your current brown bin collection. If you do not subscribe your brown bin collections will stop by 31 March 2021.

DRATE MINUTES

Parish Council meeting of Monday 11th January 2021 at 8.03pm. Due to the current government regulations the Parish Council is unable to hold Parish Council meetings in the Village Hall. This meeting was held remotely using Zoom.

PRESENT: Cllr Baxter, Beazley, Bryant, Harvey, Jones, Orson, Wightwick In attendance: Eric Buckmaster (District & County Councillor)(his report is Appendix 1), Christine Law (Parish Clerk).

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

a) No members of the public were present.

BUSINESS MEETING STARTED AT 8.30pm

67) APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

a. PCSO Leon DeBruyn. PCSO's – He is not able to join us on our zoom meeting, but he has reported that has nothing new to report to us.

68) COUNCILLOR'S DECLARATION OF INTEREST

a. Cllrs. Beazley & Wightwick declared an interest in New Homes Bonus item 77 a) Play Equipment proposal and 77 b) Notice Board for Terlings Park as they are Terlings Park Management Company directors and Terlings Park residents.

69) MINUTES FOR APPROVAL

a. The minutes of the 9^{th of} November 2020 Business Meeting were proposed by Cllr. Jones and seconded by Cllr. Baxter.

70) ACCOUNTS

a. Clerks summary of Accounts. These were proposed by Cllr Jones and seconded by Cllr Beazley. (Appendix 2)

- b. Precept for 2021/2022 was discussed and it was agreed to keep this at £12,750.00. After this meeting the form was signed by Cllr Orson, Bryant & Harvey. Then Clerk sent the precept form to EHDC accounts,
- c. Stop Harlow North balance of funds were discussed and the proposal to move the funds to Hunsdon, Eastwick, Gilston Neighbourhood Planning Group funds were agreed. Proposed by Cllr Wightwick and seconded by Cllr Jones. The clerk will write to SHN with the council's outcome
- d. Terlings Park playground It was asked if the funding for the playground be increased by £300.00 making a total of £1,000.00. This was proposed by Cllr Bryant and seconded by Cllr Harvey. Carried unanimously.

71) PLANNING AND ASSOCIATED APPLICATION

- a. Places for People:
 - i. Outline planning permission with all matters reserved apart from external vehicular access for a mixed-use development of up to 8,500 homes for a part of the Gilston Area.
 - ii. Detailed planning permission for alteration to the existing Fifth Avenue bridge.
 - iii. Detailed Planning Permission for erection of a new road, pedestrian, and cycle way. All awaiting permission. No update.

The HEGNPG are in the process of formulating a response to the revised applications. that will be published on their website www.hegnp.org.uk/ together with guidance for residents making their own responses. Consultation responses to be submitted by 21st January 2021.

- b. Grassland, Pye Corner Widening of access 3/19/0849/FUL has gone to appeal and awaiting decision.
- c. 1 Gilston Park House 3 applications for this property –.
 - i. Kitchen hood exhaust replacement requiring a new hole in outside wall. Existing hole for the old hood exhaust to be permanently closed and in-filled with materials matching wall stone colour. Granted 26.11.2020.
 - ii. Install two external Victorian style wrought iron lanterns on the porch, requiring two 2-centimetre holes in outside wall (4.2 metre above ground level). Granted 17.12.2020.
- d. 95 Pye Corner, Gilston. First floor rear extension, enlargement of first floor side window and change first floor rear window to obscured glass. Refused 17.12.2020.
- e. 7 Roseley Cottages, Eastwick. Variation on condition 2 (approved plans) 3/19/0585/FUL. Awaiting decision.
- f. Play Equipment Terlings Park. Awaiting decision.
 - g. Land in Gilston Lane Between Church cottages and Black Cottage. This was discussed in full and the council raised no objections subject to the Officers report/condition of 2006 being upheld.

72) UPDATE ON ITEMS WITH EAST HERTS/HERTFORDSHURE CC FOR ACTION

- a. Cllr Orson reported that progress has been made following his letter of 15 July 2020 raising formal complaints on several matters to Richard Cassidy EHC Chief Executive
 - i. A follow up zoom meeting with Sara Saunders Head of Service to discuss outstanding planning issues is being scheduled and will be reported at our next meeting.
 - ii. £40,000 S106 money for Village Hall improvements that had been reallocated elsewhere by EHC has been reinstated.

73) PARISH PATHS

- a. Cllr Jones reported that due to the bad weather he has been able to survey the footpaths. The footpath benches have been installed Cock Robin Lane/Eastwick Lane.
- b. Footpath E2 Oak tree in need on some attention and will be looked at in the spring. Also looking at the two moats in Eastwick. Finally, footpaths have been well used this year.
- c. Fiddlers Brook bridge by footpath E29 the fence needs repair. To be looked at further.
- d. The footpath at the northern end of Cock Robin Lane E2 is impassable as sugar beet has been lifted but farm machinery will not be able to work on land until the ground has sufficiently dried out
- e. Trees Little Park Concerns have been raised again about the trees that face onto Gilston Lane from this property. The Clerk will write to the owner again asking for a progress report.

a. Knight Frank's report on estate management matters is attached (appendix 3)

75) NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

- a. Cllr Bryant reported that HEGNPG had held a Zoom webinar earlier this evening to present their views on Places for People's current planning application revisions and to take residents questions. This had been attended by over 70 residents.
- b. Cllr Orson thanked Cllr Bryant and Cllr Frank O'Shea from Hunsdon Parish Council for their work in preparation for the Neighbourhood Plan examination.

76) HIGHWAYS

- a. Cllr Wightwick made apologies that he had been unable to prepare a Highways update report for this meeting and would give a full update at our next meeting.
- b. Cllr Harvey requested an update from Cllr Buckmaster on funding for a speed and traffic volume assessment in support of a 20mph speed limit through Eastwick Village. Cllr Buckmaster advised that he had not identified a solution for funding so far and that he would report back at our next meeting..

77) NEW HOMES BONUS

- a. Play Equipment proposal for Terlings Park. Cllr Wightwick reported that a planning application has been submitted to the planning department and now awaiting their decision.
- b. Community Notice Board Terlings Park Cllr Wightwick presented proposals for installation of a community notice board within Terlings Park at a previous meeting and is now confirming whether planning consent is required. Cllr Buckmaster informed the meeting that he has a budget that might be available to help fund the noticeboard and invited Cllr Wightwick to make an application.

78) VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

a. Cllr Bryant reported that 4 quotes have been received for improvement of the kitchen.

79) ADOPTION OF WHAT3WORDS

a. Cllr Orson propose that the Parish Council adopt use of what3words for reporting locations for incidence of fly-tipping, footpath maintenance and assets such as defibrillators. Just over 80% of services including emergency services in the UK now use what3words. This was proposed by Cllr Jones and seconded by Cllr Beazley.

80) CORRESPONDENCE

- a. Email from Kirsty Elliot of Terlings Park asking if the map on the front of the Parish Magazine Terlings Park could have identified. To be assessed by the Magazine Editor.
- b. Email from Kirsty Elliott of Terlings Park regarding the recent flooding in Burnt Mill Lane, Terlings Park and surrounding areas. The issues raised were possible mitigations for flooding in this area and the implications for Places for People's proposals for the future uses of Burnt Mill Lane. It was noted that this area is designated as Flood Plain. The future use of Burnt Mill Lane as major route to the station and the impact of flooding on route access will be raised with the PC's/HEGNPG other comments on the current Places for People OPA consultation.

Nature Notes by the late Cynthia Howe, long-time nature lover and

resident of Gilston.

March - Surprising Behaviour By No-tail The Pigeon.

I have sometimes mentioned No-Tail the pigeon, usually when writing about other happenings but now there is a surprising change in his life.

He has been here for a number of years looking back through the blog, I seem to have first written about No-Tail 6 years ago and his mate has been with him almost as long, he is never far from the garden and always nests within its confines. He can usually be found perching on one of the trees, resting or feeding on one of the lawns or feeding at one of the food stations.

He has always been with the same mate, clearly the tail is not part of the attraction with pigeons as he has none, as his name suggests. With No-Tail he not only looks different, but his gait is much more swaying than a normal pigeon and there is a subtle difference in the way he flies.

Each year No-Tail builds the nest, and his compliant mate dutifully lays the eggs, sadly they rarely have squabs because the squirrels usually find the nest and eat the eggs. They build another nest, lay more eggs and still the squirrels often find it. A few years back they did successfully breed but when the youngster grew up he was driven away.

In the surrounding countryside we often see huge flocks of pigeons, but the garden is kept quite clear of these by No-Tail. He is very territorial about his garden and other pigeon/s who visit are sent on their way without ceremony. Apart from when he drove away Broken Wing, this has until now been the only time we have seen an aggressive side to No-Tail.

Recently there was a new pigeon in the garden, he/she was a very dirty and scruffy looking pigeon, who skulked about under the edges of bushes. The newcomer tended to stay away from No-Tail and his mate and they for their part ignored him. The newcomer kept as much as he/she could to him/her self, hanging around on the fringes, never pushing in, eating after No-Tail and his mate had finished. Over the weeks the newcomer looked less dirty and better groomed, definitely a lot less dishevelled.

I noticed that although he never joined No-Tail and his partner, he/she was gradually creeping nearer to them. They continued to ignore the newcomer.

One morning I looked out and was surprised to see all three pigeons feeding together. More surprises were to come though. Over the next few days the three continued to not only feed together, but also to roost at night near to each other on the same branch, they also perched together in the daytime.

Three days ago I looked out and saw only No-Tail and the newcomer feeding together, as I watched I saw No-Tail's partner fly down to join them. She was quickly set upon by No-tail, who drove her away to the far side of the lawn. Each time she tried to join them, No-Tail chased her away.

He would fly across to her landing on her back, she would extricate herself and move away, but each time she tried to move nearer the same happened. Eventually she flew right away out of the garden. Each time she tried to return, this behaviour continued, throughout Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, then she learned to keep away from the other two. The rolls are switched she now feeds alone when the other two are not around and perches night and day on a tree branch across the road.

No-Tail was so faithful to her for so many years, they were always together, feeding, grooming, billing and cooing, roosting and perching together, where one was so was the other and yet now they are as far apart as they had previously been close.

March Letter 2021

Dear Friends,

As you drive into our villages some things are still the same. The sign by High Wych allotments telling you if you're driving too fast, relatives still tending graves in the churchyards and the bin men still dutifully collecting our refuge. Other things have changed. No lights on in our pubs. Village hall car parks on a Saturday night empty of cars to take party revellers home. The school playground is eerily quiet.

I have just read Professor Tom Wright's book called "God and the Pandemic" where he makes comparisons with the pandemic and the Second World War. Speaking about 1930s Germany, Pastor Martin Neimoller said: First they came for the Jews; but I did nothing because I am not a Jew. Then they came for the socialists, but I did nothing because I am not a socialist. Then they came for the Catholics, but I did nothing because I'm not a Catholic. Finally, they came for me, but by then there was no one left to help me.

So in some way it may have been with the British and American reaction to the coronavirus. First it hit the Chinese, but we aren't Chinese and China is a long way away and strange things (like eating pangolins) happen there. Then it hit Iran, but we didn't worry because Iran, too, is far away, and anyway it's such a very different place. Then it struck Italy, but we thought, Well, the Italians are sociable, tactile people, of course it will spread there, but we'll be alright. And then it arrived in London and New York...And suddenly there was no safe space on the planet. Then there is that inevitable question of "Where is God in all this?"

At present I have the privilege of working in one of the vaccination centres in Harlow. From the window I can see the queue snaking round the car park and wonderful volunteer stewards supporting and encouraging in the freezing weather. It reminds me that the last time I stood in such a queue was at Heathrow Airport clutching my passport. Here the queue is a for a passport that mercifully you cannot buy with money and where humanity reaches out to give hopefully a passport to life beginning with the most vulnerable. I am intrigued by the diversity of the queue. There are those with portable oxygen and indeed those who may have benefitted from the same followed by folk in their eighties sporting track suit and trainers who have run a couple of miles to reach their appointment. Others hide their faces from the advancing needle whilst a few want to watch the vaccine drawn up in case you are injecting them with some unknown substance. Jokers screech before being jabbed - unhelpful to the person behind who confides they have been awake all night worried about the anticipated event. The computer temporarily crashes and the slow forward momentum of the queue halts. A man frustratingly remarks "Jesus Christ! Is this the queue?" No one replies and no one answers back; after all it's not as if we are queuing at Primark for the January Sales! This is a queue in which you obey the rules where we are aware there are many out there that would take our hallowed place. And I think "Jesus why don't you surprise him and the whole queue and answer him and say out loud "What bothers you my friend? You look upset – come and tell me all about it."

Then a 95 year-old gentleman trips over his walking stick as he hurries forward and falls smashing his face and knee on the ground. No social distancing now – humanity reaches forth to offer tissues for his bleeding nose - someone removes their coat to pillow his head. The angry man stairs at the ground. Having mentioned your name on arrival, he does not realise that you are also in the queue and that you stand alongside each one of us sharing our day – loving us and wanting you to be part of our day even when we show no acknowledgement.

Finally to refer back to that question "Where is God in all this" I conclude with the end of a poem written by Malcolm Guite.

And where is Jesus this strange Eastertide?
He slips away from church, shakes off our linen bands
To don his apron with a nurse: he grips
And lifts a stretcher, soothes with gentle hands
The frail flesh of the dying, gives them hope,
Breathes with the breathless, lends them strength to cope.

On Thursdays we applauded, for he came
And served us in a thousand names and faces
Mopping our sick room floors and catching traces
Of that corona which was death to him:
Good Friday happened in a thousand places
Where Jesus held the helpless, died with them
That they might share his Easter in their need,
Now they are risen with him, risen indeed.

At this difficult time, we are fortunate to live in such a lovely area where we can take exercise close to home in attractive and interesting surroundings. One of the local delights is the number of thatched buildings.

Thatch was once the roofing choice of the poor as it was locally sourced, inexpensive and sustainable; now it seems that only the better-off can afford the necessary regular servicing and replacement. Most roofs are thatched with long wheat straw and many are topped out with a decorative straw feature on the apex. These are called straw finials.

Pheasants and foxes are still among the favourites for this tradition that goes back centuries. These finials may once have been installed to keep away birds or even witches, while some may have been the trademark of the individual thatcher. Today, they are more likely chosen by the customer from an online catalogue. They seem to be more abundant and varied than ever.

I have spotted some fine examples around The Hundred Parishes such as the two running hares on a cottage at Ashdon. In Finchingfield and Radwinter you may find families of ducks and there is a large thatched cow on the barn of the Red Cow pub at Chrishall.

You may see a hare on Dick Turpin's Cottage at Hempstead or a galloping horse at Great Bardfield. High Roding has a delightful cat stretching up the chimney stack and a fox chases a hare in Brent Pelham. An eagle has landed in Aythorpe Roding and there is a flying pig in Ugley.

The 16th-century Thatchers pub at Hatfield Heath is appropriately situated on a road that was once part of the route for horse-drawn cartage of wheat from Suffolk to London.

Do keep looking up!
