EASTWICK AND GILSTON PARISH COUNCIL PARISH COUNCILLOR VACANCIES

After the May Parish Council elections we now have two vacancies for Parish Councillors within the Parish Council. Parish Councillor's and the Parish Council have the responsibility of representing the views of local residents on matters such as planning applications, management of local services and the local environment. In addition to the routine, we also face a number of challenges with the continuing issue of proposed house building in our villages that will impact our Parish as a whole.

To qualify to be a Parish Councillor the rules say:

Subject therefore to the rules on disqualification a person is qualified it they are a Commonwealth citizen (which includes a British subject), are over 18 and are an elector. In addition, they will be qualified if they have either during the whole of the twelve months before the day on which they are nominated as a candidate, or the day of the election, resided in the locality or within three miles if it or occupied as owner or tenant any land or premises in the locality or had their principal or only place of work there. Such work need not be paid, but must be substantial; it may even include duties which the candidate was elected to perform before the election by the very same council as that to which they are now seeking election.

We are able to co-opt two residents for the vacant Parish Council seats and if you are interested in finding out about the role of Parish Councillor please contact Christine Law, Parish Clerk on 01279 411646 or email: Christine.law2@btinternet.com for an informal discussion.

Countdown to Easter

I don't know about you, but I am still remembering Christmas and all that it meant to us this year. The amazing Christmas services, the opportunities to meet and share life together and the fantastic amounts of money raised for the 2 charities we agreed to support this year. All the Outdoor services supported The Winter Night Shelter in Bishop Stortford and we have been able to give them over £600 and we also supported the Children's Society with the collections from our Christingles to the tune of over £600 as well. SHROVE TUESDAY AND SHROVETIDE



Once, twice, thrice, I give thee warning, Please to make pancakes 'Gin tomorrow morning.

Shrove Tuesday or Pancake day is the day before Lent begins. Eggs ands fat were not eaten during Lent so they had to be used up and pancakes were the traditional way of doing this. It was often a time of great festivity before the fasting and penance during Lent.

A MODEL VILLAGE THE GILSTON/EASTWICK ESTATE

In April 1851, *The Illustrated London News* reported the imminent sale of the manor of Gilston, known as New Place, shown in the picture below. It was purchased, unseen, by a dynamic and prosperous businessman who had made a fortune in the City and was looking for a new project to consume his energies

and huge wealth. Being a single man, and possessed of a large fortune, it might be assumed that John Hodgson would be on the look out for a wife but John Hodgson never did marry. He lived out his bachelor life at Gilston, along with William, his older brother; the transformation of his estate still unfinished on his death in 1882.

Hodgson was appalled at the condition of the estate. New Place might have been new when it was built in the early 17th century, but by the mid 19th century it was old, decrepit and damp. And the estate was in no better condition. According to the late John Clarke, Gilston historian, the farms were "worn out and in a state of disrepair and the villagers' houses were no more than peasants' hovels; indescribably filthy, insanitary, cold and damp". Hodgson resolved that everything must go.



The manor house was the first to be torn down. In its place there rose a vast baronial hall in the Scottish style, incorporating every exuberant feature associated with High Victorian Gothic architecture; turrets, gables, pointed arches, elaborate porches, bay windows, medieval gargoyles and stained glass. Even today the effect is quite startling. In this extravagant setting, Hodgson lived the life of a country gentleman, entertaining lavishly with hunting and shooting parties, boating and fishing on the lake, picnics and musical gatherings.

But Hodgson aspired to more than a life of personal comfort. He wanted to transform the lives of others by turning his estate into a model village which would be entirely self-sufficient. The concept was not new; later in the century it was developed on a much grander scale by the Cadbury and Rowntree families and by William Lever at Port Sunlight but it was a "first" for Hertfordshire.

Hodgson's motives must remain a mystery; they may have been purely philanthropic. However, as an astute businessman, he knew that it made sense to provide his workers with good housing. In addition, a model village would mean substantial savings of time and energy for the estate workers as all their needs would be met through building a dairy, shop, laundry and school in the village. Whatever the reasons, there is no doubt that Hodgson spent a fortune on his project.

He took enormous pride in the quality of the work; everything was done in the best possible taste. Carved barge boarding, shown in the photo of the old School House, ran around the eaves of the buildings; diapered brickwork created a decorative effect and all the houses had diamond shaped lattice windows.





A broad front porch with decorated timbers provided a useful shelter and storage area for muddy boots. Hodgson's monogram was set into the brickwork, together with the date of the building in separate quatrefoil shapes.

The first houses were constructed of red brick with black used for diaper work. Then, in 1860, yellow/white brick was used. The reason for the change is unknown. They make an attractive contrast which may have appealed to Hodgson. Alternatively, he may have acquired a "job lot" of the paler coloured bricks at a keen price. He was certainly able to profit from the recent abolition of the brick tax. This had been in force since the American War of Independence and stood at 5s 10d per 1000 bricks.

The workers' houses were one-up-one-down – impossibly cramped to our modern eyes, but highly desirable by the standards of the day. They provided a solid, waterproof home and their tall chimneys were effective in drawing up the smoke from the fires. However, Hodgson was careful to observe the social hierarchy on the estate. Compared to the workers' dwellings, the farmhouses were positively grand. Interestingly, they lack the decorative effects of the smaller homes, as if the prettiness of the brickwork could compensate for the modesty of the living space within! Since Hodgson's day, the original houses have been knocked into multiple-roomed dwellings.

PANCAKES WITH LEMON AND SUGAR OR HONEY



8oz flour 4 eggs 1pt milk A little butter and salt

Put the flour into a basin and make a well in he middle; gradually whisk or beat in the milk and eggs and when all the flour is mixed in, add the butter and salt. Leave to stand for ½ hour.

Use a little oil in frying pan (a brush is helpful) and thinly spread the batter over the hot pan. Turn or toss and when the pancake is ready you can either serve immediately with accompaniments or stack them and keep warm in the oven.



Nature Notes by the late Cynthia Howe, long-time nature lover and resident of Gilston

Thursday 4 February 2010 Corvid and Seagull

It is a dreary, grey, drizzly day. On the drive to Reading, we passed a stretch of road along which shrubs had been planted between trees, although leafless, this stretch was beautiful. Several trees were bedecked with hanging catkins in shades from pinkish to cream and yellow. There were bare stems of red and yellow and small trees covered in small fir cones.

I watched a large corvid and a seagull tussling with each other: chasing, wheeling, diving, swooping, swiftly turning on each other until eventually the seagull chased its large black aggressor away.

Sunday 7 February 2010 Tough Winter for the Birds

I recently read a report on the death of birds this very cold winter, especially mentioned were wrens and dunnocks, so I am very happy to note that it is rare that I don't see both of these each time I look out of a window. We are so lucky to have not lost these particular inhabitants of our garden.

Jean next door told me, on the telephone, that they have lost all the blue tits visiting their garden and maybe the robin as well.

Wednesday 10 February 2010 Fifty Goldfinches

The wind picked up the brown, crispy, dried winter leaves and danced across the lawn with them.

Yesterday the moorhen spent all day in our pond.

We are still experiencing days of cold with sudden snow flurries; today is no exception.

Each afternoon between 4 and 5 we are entertained by a charm of goldfinches flying to and fro, back and forth, around, over and through our garden briefly settling every few minutes, then up and off again. It is a large number – upward of fifty. How good to see so many.

Now we are in the middle of a snowstorm. It is settling so thick and fast you cannot even see beyond the end of the garden into the fields beyond.

Wednesday 17 February 2010 Finally Sunshine

Driving to Reading along the A414 we see flooded fields and deeper than we have seen for a long time. The view is stunning with the bright sun reflecting off the moving water in the flooded fields. Everywhere is bright and light – it seems ages since we have seen sunshine such as this.

There are so many catkins showing with the sunlight on them. Because the winter has been so cold and so wet the trunks and branches of the leafless trees shine moss green. On the grass verge, just before the big Tesco store at Hatfield, sat a big grey rabbit in the sunshine. He was just sitting, meditatively chewing and, I imagine, enjoying the sun's warmth.

On the edge of the M4, approaching Slough, I watched a crow or rook mobbing a red kite.

For those who are experiencing problems with the Menopause:

What is the Perimenopause/Menopause? The menopause is when an individual's periods stop due to lower levels of a hormone called oestrogen. The menopause typically occurs between the ages of 45 and 55, with the average age being 51 years old in the UK. However, 1 in 100 people will experience menopause before the age of 40 years. The menopause can happen naturally or for reasons such as surgery to remove the ovaries (oophorectomy) or the uterus (hysterectomy), cancer treatments like chemotherapy or a genetic reason. Sometimes the reason is unknown. The charity Wellbeing of Women estimates there are around 13 million women in the UK who are perimenopausal or menopausal. This equates to around a third of the UK female population. The perimenopause is when someone has symptoms of the menopause but their periods have not stopped. The perimenopause is caused by fluctuating oestrogen, which impacts women's menstrual cycle, shifting their regular period to a more erratic cycle. Perimenopause ends when someone has not had a period for 12 months. The length of the perimenopause also differs from woman to woman. Although some women will experience symptoms of the perimenopause for a couple of years, some women can experience this stage for over a decade. Some women can start the perimenopause as early as their twenties, but most women will start it in their mid-40s.

Now a report called <u>'Let's Talk about the Menopause'</u> has been commissioned by the Hertfordshire and West Essex Integrated Care Board (ICB) Primary Care Board. 560 women living in Hertfordshire, shared how they had been supported by primary care services during menopause or perimenopause and gave their suggestions about how the local NHS could best help them. Survey respondents said that they would like GPs to be better trained so they are more empathetic, listen to what women are saying and don't dismiss their concerns when they ask for help with the menopause or perimenopause.

<u>What are Men's Sheds?</u> Men's Sheds are community spaces for men to connect, converse and create. The activities are often similar to those of garden sheds, but for groups of men to enjoy together. They help reduce loneliness and isolation, but most importantly, they're fun.

Chilly conditions often greet us as we step outside in the early months of the year. The old saying - "When the wind is out of the East, tis never good for man nor beast" - certainly rings true. Before the advent of broadcast weather forecasts, people had to rely on checking nearby weathervanes for the wind direction. These were usually found on tall buildings such as church spires, while Audley End House has gilded weathervanes mounted on eight corner turrets. Today, a variety of designs can be seen.

Robert McFarlane's books of old words include about fifty that describe winds, storms or clouds. One Essex term he mentions is *aigrish*, used to describe a sharp cutting wind. The East Anglian word for a strong sudden gust is *gussock*, or *twitchy* for an unsteady wind.

Forecasting the weather for those who till the soil is helpful as weeks of westerly winds can bring relentless rain causing waterlogging of the ground, while cold easterly winds dry out the soil and retard growth.

Currently, the UK Meteorological Office operates over 200 official automated sites, each recording accurate measurements of temperature, wind speed and direction, and the amount of precipitation. These readings are processed by powerful computers and the results enable forecasters to make predictions about future weather conditions. Local recording sites include the Cambridge Botanic Gardens and Stansted Airport. By searching the Met Office website https://www.metoffice.gov.uk you can check the local weather forecast to help plan your day.

Many individuals or schools are interested in operating a personal weather station and the Met Office is keen to enhance the weather observations network; it asks those who have a personal weather station, manual or automatic, to send data to its Weather Observations Website, WOW, at https://wow.metoffice.gov.uk.
